ACTAEON. The son of Aristaeus and Autonoe and the grandson of Cadmus, Actaeon had the misfortune of discovering Artemis (Diana) as she bathed with her nymphs in the nude. The chaste goddess, embarrassed and startled, splashed Actaeon with water and transformed him into a stag. As he stumbled through the woods, his hunting dogs attacked him and tore him to pieces. In the *Metamorphoses*, Ovid states that the gods disagreed about the punishment Artemis handed the unfortunate hunter: some thought she was merciless; others felt that she was justified in defending her chastity.

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ADMETUS. See Alcestis; Apollo, as Shepherd.

**ADONIS.** The offspring of an incestuous relationship between King Cinyras of Cyprus and his daughter, Myrrha, Adonis was a young hunter of great beauty. His comeliness attracted the attention of the goddess Aphrodite (Venus) and they became lovers; Aphrodite bore him two children.

One day, despite Aphrodite's constant fears for his safety, Adonis went out hunting and was killed by a wild boar. (In some versions of the myth, the boar was either a jealous Hephaestus or Ares in disguise.)
